#SOCIALMEDIOLOGY

by Liam Herne

9 December 2020 – 25 February 2021 • During opening hours • CS Gallery

This retrospective exhibition by Liam Herne explores the human condition in relation to our online habits and the way we communicate with each other on social media. Presenting five years of drawing, sculpture, photography and digital art, Herne questions the connection between our behaviour in the digital realm and how we act in the real world. Memes, selfies, trending news, and technology's wide impact on culture are all unpacked in this varied exhibition.

Currently based in Brisbane, Liam Herne is originally from Watford, UK and predominately works with a mix of traditional processes and new media. He has exhibited in various locations around the world. Herne is also the coordinator of The Incubator, an exhibition focused on promoting the work of young artists in Brisbane.

NEVER BE LATE FOR A PARADE

Illustrations by Shuan Tan

1 December 2020 – 7 March 2021 • During Library opening hours Melton Library and Learning Hub

Presented in partnership with Books Illustrated, this exhibition features a collection of prints of illustrations from Shaun Tan's best-known picture books including *The Arrival*, *The Red Tree*, *The Lost Thing* and the *Singing Bones*, and celebrates his unique approach to storytelling through this selection of brilliant images, as varied and fascinating as their narratives.

Shaun Tan currently works as an artist and author in Melbourne, and is best known for illustrated books that deal with social and historical subjects through dream-like imagery. Shaun has also worked as a theatre designer, a concept artist for animated films including Pixar's WALL-E, and directed the Academy Award-winning short film The Lost Thing. In 2011 he received the prestigious Astrid Lindgren Memorial Award, honouring his contribution to international children's literature.

WATCHING FROM AFAR

Susumu Matsuura and Thomas C. Chung

3 March – 29 April 2021 • During opening hours • CS Gallery

Susumu Matsuura (Japan) and Thomas C. Chung (Australia) present an observational study of the cultural changes caused by COVID-19. Living in separate countries, they tackle the impact of social distancing in different contexts, both in their personal lives, and in the communities around them. Their work includes photographic prints, metal sculptures, animated video art and traditional printmaking with collage.

Susumu Matsuura specialises in silkscreen printmaking, has won several awards, and has exhibited work at JR Sapporo Station ART BOX, Japan; Tokyo Wonder Site, Japan; Gallery PRÁM, Czech Republic.

Thomas C. Chung specialises in conceptual art, and has exhibited work at Casula Powerhouse Arts Centre, Australia; Ministry of Foreign Affairs, South Korea; National Centre for Contemporary Arts, Russia; YIA Basel Art Center, Switzerland.

RECLAIM

Group Exhibition

16 March – 9 June 2021 • During Library opening hours Melton Library and Learning Hub

This group exhibition curated by Karyn Leong features diverse artists in the Melton and Bacchus Marsh region who have charted their artistic response to COVID-19 as it sweeps the world, bringing new experiences of lockdown, isolation, lost plans, fearing for themselves and their family's health and feeling powerless. The exhibition explores how these adverse conditions inspired local artists to be creative and react to the pandemic positively, using their art to reclaim a sense of control over their own individuality and self-expression. The exhibition includes paintings, photography, illustrations, weaving, digital art, fibre-making and poetry.

REAL | LOCAL

by Atong Atem

5 May - 25 July 2021 • During opening hours • CS Gallery

Award-winning artist, Atong Atem, shares contemporary photographic portraits alongside works from a collaborative project with local residents of South Sudanese heritage. Atem's photography and video work explore contemporary identity through portraiture, with a focus on de-colonising narratives in the African diaspora. She explores the ways we construct images to understand ourselves, our history and our surroundings. Her intimate portraits are vibrant and sentimental performances, which at the same time honour the authenticity of the individual, and record a moment in political and social time.

Atem has exhibited her work across Australia, including National Gallery of Victoria, MUMA Monash, Gertrude Contemporary, Australian Centre for Contemporary Art and Internationally at Red Hook Labs in New York, Vogue Fashion Fair in Milan and Unseen Amsterdam photography festival.

This exhibition explores the diversity of the animal kingdom, from endangered species to human's best friends. Local artists Allyson Watts, Jacqueline Le Souef and Glenys Nicholls, exhibit watercolour, pastel and acrylic paintings which celebrate the enjoyment of observing the natural world. This exhibition aims to foster respect and a sense of connection with our furry and feathered friends.

Allyson Watts is an emerging artist who is part of the Melton U3A art group and has participated in four local exhibitions. Jacqueline Le Souef has displayed work in numerous exhibitions and has artworks in private collections in Ireland, UK, USA and Japan. Glenys Nicholls also participates in the U3A Melton Art Group and has previously exhibited in many locations around Victoria.

LONGING FOR HOME, WATER RITUAL

By Sofie Dieu

3 August - 6 October • During opening hours • CS Gallery

This installation explores the experience of first generation Australian women through their connection to the Australian bush. Framing women as the earth's ambassadors and as the active voices that shape society, Dieu worked with 50 migrant women living in suburban Melbourne. Together they embroidered symbols of water, flora, fauna, immigration and womanhood, creating over 60 embroideries. These formed a 3 meter diameter dress which is the centrepiece of this installation.

Sofie Dieu has degrees in Textile Design and Sculpture, and Visual Art and Contemporary Practice. She currently teaches design theory at Monash University. As an artist she has collaborated with leading mental health and refugee advocacy organisations, and received numerous residencies and Awards. Sofie originally created this exhibition in partnership with the Victorian Immigrant and Refugee Women Coalition.

STATE OF MIND

Tasmina Majles turned her creative drawing practice to capture her personal experience of Covid-19. Finely drawn lines on paper chart her own experience of self-connection, transformation and wellbeing. Observing her own emotions, fears and struggles, her hand-drawn abstract depictions reflect the blurring events, internal spaces and personal thoughts both loud and soft that filled her daily life in isolation.

Tasmina K Majles is a Bangladeshi born visual artist living in Melbourne. Her art practice focuses on the intersection of figurative and abstract representation. She has completed Master of Creative Arts in Painting from Deakin University and her work has been exhibited at Box Hill Arts Centre and Phoenix Gallery, as well as in international shows organised by Edge: The Foundation and the United Nations.

We celebrate the creativity and initiative of self-published and independent children's illustrators and writers in our community with this double-bill exhibition at Melton Library over the summer holidays!


