

KEY CHALLENGES

- Disproportionate health issues, such as chronic diseases and lower life expectancy compared to the general population.
- Limited access to government support due to residency or citizenship status.
- Employment concentrated in low-income and unskilled labor sectors.
- Limited education pathways for young people due lack of support.

OPPORTUNITIES

- Growing participation in education and professional occupations, spurred by social integration and improved access to resources.
- Develop health programs to address chronic diseases and improve life expectancy.
- Advocate for policy changes to improve access to government support.
- Create skill development and employment programs to transition from low-income jobs to skilled positions.
- Establish educational support programs for young people to pursue higher education and vocational training.

OCEANIA CULTURE

VALUES

- Family and community are central to Oceania culture, often expressed through collectivist and kinship practices.
- Respect, commitment to community, and hospitality are significant cultural attributes.

RELIGION

 Predominantly Judeo-Christian, with various denominations (especially, Catholicism, Methodist and Protestant beliefs) may have more adherents depending on the Oceania country in which it first took root.

CUSTOMS AND ETIQUETTE

- Community gatherings or activities play a critical role in maintaining cultural identity and integrity.
- Oceania traditions include some of the most unique forms of artistic expression including folk tales, music, dance, and buildings.

OCEANIA IN AUSTRALIA

SETTLEMENT HISTORY IN AUSTRALIA

 Migration began in the 19th century due to labor opportunities, with significant growth post-WWII and during the late 20th century.

OCEANIA REGION

• The Pacific Ocean, covering approximately 168 million square kilometres, is the world's largest ocean.

POPULATION

 The region has a population of around 43 million people, with diverse ethnic groups and languages.

ENVIRONMENTAL SIGNIFICANCE

 Oceania is home to vital ecosystems, including Coral reefs and faces challenges like climate change and rising sea levels.

ECONOMIES

- Economies vary:
 - agriculture-based (e.g., Samoa, Tonga)
 - resource-rich (e.g., Papua New Guinea)
 - tourism-driven (e.g., Fiji, Tahiti)
